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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

College Managing Committee, New Delhi, the renowned international charitable educational organization, to **mark the 100th year** of the phenomenal service rendered by it in the field of education. **Into the fourth decade of its existence,** the college can proudly look back at the string of impressive achievements it has to its credit. The DAV philosophy is based on the lives of **noble souls** such as **Swami Dayanand Saraswati, Mahatma Hansraj, Mahatma Anand Swami,** and other virtuous pioneers who provided a vision and mission and left behind footsteps to follow on the path of wisdom and glory. The President, DAVCMC, New Delhi, Arya Rattan Padma Shri Dr. Punam Suri, our mentor, philosopher, guide, and an eminent educationist endowed with a powerful vision, now carries forward this noble work.

DAV Centenary College, Faridabad **affiliated** with Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak Haryana was accredited with 'A' grade (CGPA of 3.11 score) in NAAC, Cycle II (2015) and with 'B' grade in NAAC Cycle I (2003). The college also participates in the NIRF.

The college has an excellent infrastructure over a built-up **area of 5675 sq. mt.** which is our pride. Apart from impressive and well-maintained buildings with smart rooms, computer labs, an e-library, and a spacious sound-proof auditorium with a flawless sound system, for a plethora of activities and programs. Our teachers have published many books, and research papers in reputed journals. The college publishes two **multi-disciplinary peer-reviewed journals**, two magazines, two **edited books and** two **conference proceedings**.

The college provides **sports facilities, a gymnasium, Yoga and Meditation room**, for Physical and Mental wellness. **Spiritual and mental well-being** is promoted through organizing **extension lectures, seminars, workshops, and monthly Hawan Yajna.** In our Institutional Development Plan, the college aims to introduce a wider range of courses and enhance our research and innovation capabilities.

Institutional Strength

- The college, drawing inspiration from the DAV education movement of the 1860s, has been at the forefront of educational innovation. Its mission is to offer inclusive and high-quality education to a wide demographic, with the ultimate goal of positioning India as a global hub for knowledge, culture, research, and innovation.
- The College has offered **14 programs** with a wide spectrum of courses across disciplines of **Science**, **Humanities**, **Commerce**, **Computers**, **Management**, **Tourism**, **and Journalism** all approved by MDU, Rohtak. **B Voc in Retail Management** program has been introduced in college **in 2021-22**. The college offers **numerous add-on courses and Value added courses**
- The College has an adequate infrastructure and other facilities for, teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc. ICT-enabled facilities such as smart class, E-library, Wi-Fi-enabled campus, etc. The Central library of the college has a large collection of books, e-books, and e-journals and it is automated.
- The College has a **well-qualified and dedicated faculty**, who impart academic teachings to the students. The college has a dedicated **research room and research committee** to encourage students and faculty to **develop their research and innovation ecosystem**.
- The college has **sports facilities** which includes a **shooting range**, **archery training area**, **a modern gymnasium**, **a yoga room**, **a meditation room**, **and a playground** in the college campus that helps the students and staff **to maintain their physical fitness and mental fitness**.
- The NCC, NSS, Youth Red Cross, and other cells and committees of the college are active and carry out several programs throughout the year. The College campus is green and spacious and is free from plastic.

Institutional Weakness

- The college urgently requires to recruit regular teachers both in Grant-in Aid against sanction post and Self-Finace Scheme.
- There is a **shortage of study resources in regional languages** which limits the academic pursuits of its multi-lingual students.
- The college is under **obligation to follow the curriculum approved by the parent university**.
- More digital, and modern classrooms are required in the college.
- The institution's growth suffered significantly due to the COVID pandemic and the institute is unable to regain the previous state of growth till date.

Institutional Opportunity

- The College imbibes a strong work culture and generates deep social values.
- Add-on programs, certificate programs, and MOOCs will provide greater diversity in learning for the staff and students. It will be a great opportunity to offer certificate/diploma courses with the

collaboration of other institutions. These multidisciplinary and trans-disciplinary courses will add value to the curriculum.

- The **Placement Cell** along with some departments also provides training for competitive examinations to the students and helps students to get through job interviews in different organizations.
- The College places **special emphasis on women's empowerment and the Women Cell** of the college **provides opportunities to conduct various lectures and seminars on gender-related issues.**
- **Twenty-six MoUs** have been signed with national and local organizations to promote research and entrepreneurship skills, etc.
- The college and different departments allow the use of platforms for online classes, sharing notes, notices, and other information via Google Classroom, Facebook, YouTube, Zoom, etc.
- Online fee Payment options are offered through various mediums such as cards, and UPI, streamlining the fee collection process for students and administration.
- Solar panels, solar lighting, and composed machine, etc. facilities contribute to more sustainable and eco-friendly waste management practices, reducing reliance on non-renewable resources, minimizing environmental pollution, and fostering a circular economy approach to waste management.

Institutional Challenge

- To **implement the vision of NEP 2020** infrastructural facilities in the campus need to be upgraded to initiate new courses and multidisciplinary programs.
- **Traditional modes of syllabus and curriculum** have posed a serious threat to the student community as they are not able to get jobs in the competitive market due to the increasing demand for technical and skill-based education.
- Financial hardships of the students also account for a high dropout rate.
- The college has a shortage of space for the upliftment of infrastructure and academic facilities.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- DAV Centenary College, Faridabad is an affiliated college with Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak. The college adheres to the established academic structures including academic calendar, lesson plan, and prescribed syllabus set by the affiliating university. Committed to providing facilities for the holistic development of its students, the college offers 14 programs at the undergraduate and postgraduate level. The curriculum includes 13 courses on 'Professional Ethics', 6 courses on 'Human Values & Gender', and 9 courses on 'Environment and Sustainability'.
- Various departments, Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDP), and the Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) aim to promote the spirit of entrepreneurship among students, encourage startups, and equip them with essential professional ethics.
- NSS, NCC, YRC, and Women Cell of DAV Centenary College is committed to educate students about gender issues by conducting extension lectures/seminars/workshops/rallies and promoting dialogues that promote human values rights, and gender equity.
- The Nature Interpretation Centre and Environmental Club of the college conduct tree plantation drives regularly. They organize general awareness programs about societal issues such as drug addiction, safety regulations, climate change, and sustainable practices.
- Additionally, 2249 students get enrolled in the 27 add-on courses offered by the college and 204

NPTEL/SWAYAM courses during the last five years.

- **2111 students** greatly benefited from the project work, internships, and field trips, in the year 2022-2023.
- The college provides **need-based tutorial classes** for slow and advanced learners to enhance their academic performance.
- **Regular parent-teacher meetings** are held at the departmental level to ensure students' progress.
- **ICT facilities** are provided to teachers for the well-planned delivery of the curriculum to students, including ICT-enabled classrooms for online classes, extension lectures, and webinars/seminars, which continued during COVID-19.
- The institute obtains **feedback** from its students, faculty, alumni, and employer, analyzes it, takes necessary actions, and hosts the same on its website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- DAV Centenary College, Faridabad, follows the admission guidelines set by the affiliating university. Over the last five years, our college has filled 83% of its seats, demonstrating a strong enrollment rate. Additionally, our college adheres to the reservation policy prescribed by the state government and parent university, with 68.3% of seats filled for reserved categories during the same period. Furthermore, in the last five years, 77 teachers at our college have qualified with NET and PhDs.
- The college **focuses** on **student-centric methods** such as experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies to facilitate effective activity-based teaching and learning.
- **IT infrastructure** facilities are provided by the college for the benefit of students and faculty members, playing a pivotal role in enhancing learning experiences and administrative efficiency.
- The mechanism of internal/external assessment follows the guidelines of MDU Rohtak, with 80% weightage given to external examinations and 20% to internal assessments, including internal tests, assignments, and attendance.
- At the end of each semester, **examinations are conducted and evaluated** by the university, and students can access their results from the university website.
- The college emphasizes **academic excellence** through **outcome-based** teaching and learning, prioritizing the holistic development of students.
- Student performance is assessed based on **success rates** in academics, placements, cultural and sports activities, different competitive exams, and progression in higher education.
- In the last five years (2018-19 to 2022-23), the **average examination passing rate was 72.10%**. Specifically, the results for 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22, and 2022-23 stood at 69.2%, 81.25%, 72%, 70.37%, and 66.91%, respectively.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- DAV Centenary College strives to gain excellence in Research, Innovation, and Extension activities.
- College faculty has **121 publications, in UGC Care listed journals Group I & II, UGC Approved journals, peer-reviewed journals, and print journals during the last five years.**
- 24 Faculty members have published books as authors/editors, 65 Faculty members published their chapters in Edited Books nationally and internationally, and 112 publications in conference proceedings.
- In the last five years, we have organized **42 workshops, seminars, and conferences covering diverse** topics such as research methodology, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), and Entrepreneurship

Development. These events have provided invaluable opportunities for knowledge sharing, skill development, and fostering innovation within our community.

- The College has signed 26 MoUs during the last 5 years to promote Research, Innovation, Entrepreneurship, etc.
- The college has established an **Institution's Innovation Council (IC202015337)** as per the norms of Innovation Cell, Ministry of Education, and Govt. of India during the academic calendar year 2020-21 for Innovation and knowledge transfer.
- The NSS, NCC, Women Cell, Youth Red Cross, and Legal Literacy Cell are involved in extension and outreach activities
- The College publishes two **magazines** '*Mind Guru' and* '*Shatabdi* to encourage creativity among students and teachers.
- The college also publishes two peer-reviewed multi-disciplinary journals 'Perianth' & 'The Eternal Quest of Mankind'.
- Two Special Issues: One in Literary Voice (UGC Care Group-II) and the other in Journal of Management and Entrepreneurship (UGC Care Group-I) are published research-based papers in management and related disciplines through the International Conference organized by the college.
- The College also published Edited books such as 'Sustainable Practices for a Safe and Secure Future: The Need of the Hour' under the publication of Bloomsbury, and 'Lok-Sahitya' under the publication of Sahitya Sanchay, and two conference proceedings.
- During the last five years college received 3 awards from govt. agencies and 8 awards from Non Govt. agencies. also college faculty received 6 awards from govt. agencies and 16 from non govt agencies and many awards received by the students at National/International level.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Academic bank of credit provisions recommended in the draft of the NEP 2020 for earning, transferring, and accumulation of credits of the academic programs. It offers the flexibility to redeem the

requisite credit for the award of an appropriate Certificate/ Diploma/ Degree, which provides students with an opportunity for prolonged learning as per their circumstances. It will help them to avail academic outreach beyond the superstructure of the program of study in another University/ Institution at the national/international level depending upon the student's choice. This is a novel concept for earning and depositing credit through national programs such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, and MOOCs. The ABC also ensures the opening, closing, and validation of Academic Bank Accounts and Credit Verification, Credit Accumulation, and Credit Transfer or Redemption for students. The college needs to register in the ABC to enable credit mobility. Under the prescribed CBCS curriculum being taught currently in the college at PG Level courses and two UG level courses, there are credits assigned to papers that are not transferable. But with the upcoming implementation of NEP 2020 in the coming sessions, students will create a bank of credit which will be transferable in both interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary. Students will also have multiple entry-exit options as per their requirements. Though efforts have already been initiated at the university level pre-requisite and preliminary education and awareness has also begun to be imparted at the institution's level to create an ABC ID and Digi locker account for students to reap the benefits of NEP 2020. As per the guidelines issued by the MD University, Rohtak, DAV Centenary College has started creating a Digi Locker facility for all the students in the roles. The Vice-Chancellor has requested all principals of affiliated colleges to consider making ABC ID, Aadhaar ID, and Mobile Number mandatory for students during the online admission process from the session 2023-24. As per the directions given by the parent university, the college has started to create an ABC ID for first-year students in the session 2023-24 and will implement the same for second and third-year students as soon as the University makes it.

The college continuously offers opportunities to students to develop their skills in tandem with the changing needs. It provides value-based education as a key aspect of the learning process which is executed through running various add-on/value-

added/certificate courses on regular basis. These courses not only caters to the requirement of transforming the college into a holistic multidisciplinary institution but also is in accord with NEP 2020. Such value-added courses align the curriculum with concerned industries to make students job-ready by the time they graduate. This enhances their preparedness for the world outside the college. It also focuses on capacity building with the purpose of employment generation, through active engagement with industry and society. It strives to enhance the prospects for underprivileged and differently-abled students. The students' skills are further augmented by frequent interactions with alumni and industry experts. A good number of students have also secured placements through the on/off campus drives conducted in the college premises. The college organizes various seminars, workshops, and training programs focused on key principles such as diverse curriculum and teaching methods, modern technology adoption, creativity promotion, critical thinking encouragement, logical decision-making, and innovation. Initiatives by the Entrepreneurship Development Program (EDP) Cell, Institution's Innovation Council (IIC), and Placement Cell, in collaboration with departments, clubs, and committees, aim to enhance skills among students and faculty through regular initiatives. Moreover, the college NCC/YRC/NSS/Environment club/Women Cell/EMA, etc. conducts various events/programs in the areas of community engagement and service, environmental education, and value-based education towards the attainment of multiple skills through awareness drive, rallies, camps, extension lectures, outreach programs, competitions, cultural activities. 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge DAV Centenary College promotes the study of system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using Indian languages such as Hindi and Sanskrit as well as organizes various events in regional languages like Haryanvi, Urdu, Punjabi, etc. Embracing the teachings of Mahatma Hansraj and the DAV philosophy, the college has established the Arya Samaj Unit and formed a spiritual club to spread awareness about the Indian knowledge system

Faculty members monitor the course syllabi's progress and ensure that curriculum delivery aligns with the intended objectives. To ensure successful outcomes, the college maintains an updated website with notifications and relevant circulars or revisions from the University. The college keeps an eye on the results of the programs run. Most of the programs aim at producing skilled and employment-ready professionals. The college also conducts placement drives, job fairs, industrial visits, educational tours, exhibitions, competitions on different topics, internal exams, etc. to get specific outcomes of the programs. The curriculum of most of the programs includes courses that have been designed by the parent university to include knowledge and practice for the skill development of the students. In several courses, they have practical/Laboratory part also in the curriculum. They also undergo internships for a stipulated time period by the university
6. Distance education/online education:	Our parent university i.e. Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak does not offer distance education courses in the programs run by colleges. However, amid the Covid-19 pandemic, the college had embraced digital platforms for teaching, and holding classes, conferences, and meetings. While this shifting paradigm had presented various challenges such as lacking of face-to-face interaction, lack of resources, lack of knowledge for using ICT tools and techniques, now it has also eliminated the geographical barriers, enabling interaction between experts and students worldwide. This transition has prompted the adoption of hybrid education models even after the lockdown and our college faculties have also contributed their expertise in the subjects to the students by using the hybrid mode of education. The online education system has encouraged faculty and professionals to create video lectures on their expertise or contemporary topics of interest for the welfare of the students. Presently the college is

- The college departments discuss their **proposed activities** for curriculum implementation in each academic year, and all the academic activities are discussed in the departmental meetings.
- Lesson plans prepared by the teachers for each subject based on the university curriculum to ensure effective teaching and learning delivery. These plans are displayed on notice boards and uploaded to the college portal for student convenience, containing information on syllabus, revision plans, assignments, class tests, etc.
- Moreover, for dynamic learning, departments plan various Value-added Courses, Educational Tours, Field Trips & Surveys to make the curriculum more effective.
- Every academic session starts with an **Induction/Orientation Programme** for newly admitted students by letting them for about various rules, regulations, and other information about the college.
- Class Tests, Assignments, and Internal Examinations are conducted to assess students' performance and streamline the internal assessment process. In each class, two tests and two assignments are given and thoroughly assessed by the respective teacher.
- Need-based **Tutorial** classes provided by the departments to both slow and advanced learners to improve and enhance the student's academic performance.
- **Parent-teacher meetings** are held at the departmental level regularly to involve parents & ensure collaborative efforts of both teachers & parents to improve the performance of students.

Experiential learning involves faculty members creating an enriching learning atmosphere by actively engaging students in hands-on teaching-learning content in the following manner:

- **Project Reports** are part of the curriculum and the college provides **smart rooms and computer labs.** This **enhances the efficiency and productivity of students' project work.**
- Industrial Visits, Field trips, internships, educational tours, and field surveys are organized by selected departments according to syllabus requirements to provide students with real-life exposure and to equip the students with the real working environment in industries.
- Annual Symposium Visits are assigned to students to give counseling about the courses related to Higher Education in India/Abroad under one roof.
- Science Exhibitions are conducted to enhance creativity and a better understanding of scientific methods. Thus, sparking curiosity and promoting science literacy.

Participative Learning emphasizes students' active involvement and engagement in the learning process, encouraged by faculty through various approaches as follows:

- Group Discussion activities are organized to make students participative learners to develop their in-depth learning, confidence building, critical thinking skills as well as communication skills.
- Assigning **PowerPoint presentations** to students is a beneficial practice that can lead to better educational outcomes. It not only improves their IT abilities and encourages participatory learning but also enhances creativity and helps them develop self-confidence. These skills are essential for success in the modern world and can benefit students in their academic and professional endeavors.
- Quizzes and other competitions such as Poster making, Slogan writing, Debate/Declamation/ Elocution, etc. are organized to motivate students so that students can show their creativity & teamwork and update their knowledge.
- Participation in various activities organized by NCC, NSS, and YRC helps the students to create awareness and develop their involvement in many social, cultural, and health awareness programs to inculcate the value of responsibility.
- National/International Commemorative Days/Events/Festivals are celebrated regularly and students' participations are encouraged to instill a sense of patriotism and commitment to cultural and moral heritage.

Problem-Solving approach is a method to improve the student's critical thinking and problem-solving skills through the following ways.

• Extension lectures related to resolve challenges faced by the students during their career building i.e. Interviews, Resume Writing, Competitive Exams, etc. are also conducted by various departments in collaboration with academic and industrial partners.

- **Student Exchange Programs** are arranged to provide new learning environments and real-life exposure.
- **Bridge courses and Value-Added Courses** are also run in the college for the student's growth in terms of personal and professional.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

DAV Centenary College, Faridabad is an **affiliated college** of **Maharshi Dayanand University** and therefore it follows the guidelines set by the University for the Conduct of examinations. At the end of each semester, there is a final examination which is uniformly conducted for students across all the affiliated colleges of Maharshi Dayanand University. The final exam for each paper has 80% weightage of the overall assessment and the remaining 20% constitute internal assessment marks.

Mechanism of Internal Assessment and Grievance Redressal System:

• The **internal assessment has 20% weightage** which forms a part of a continuous evaluation system conducted through internal tests, assignments, and attendance. All of these constitute an integral part of internal evaluation and assessment made by subject teachers as per the university guidelines.

- Students are provided timely notifications about internal tests, assignment deadlines, attendance criteria, and other relevant information through university circulars and departmental announcements via notice boards and class WhatsApp groups.
- If any student is absent on the day of the internal test/assignment submission, due to genuine reasons like health issues, participating in NCC/NSS/YRC/Sports activities, job interviews, etc. are given another chance to appear in the same.
- The internal evaluation and assessment process is done very carefully by the teachers and the Internal Marks are awarded. It is also checked by the **Head of the Department** for adherence.
- Finally, the internal evaluation, which is prepared by every department, is sent to Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak for **compilation of the final results**. Normally, it is sent through the university portal provided by the university for this purpose.

Mechanism of External Assessment and Grievance Redressal System:

- The **external assessment has 80% weightage** and **examinations** are conducted and evaluated by the university.
- The date of the commencement of the examination is uploaded on the University and college website also.
- A student is **required to attend minimum lectures** of theory and practical to become **eligible to appear in the examinations** as prescribed in the relevant ordinance as per university norms.
- The setting of question papers and declaration of the results are prepared at the university level and students can also access their results from the university website. Also, the university shares these results with the respective colleges for their record.
- The college has appointed **the Controller of Examination** (COE) whose **purpose is to plan and execute the process of examinations systematically and professionally.**
- If students have grievances related to re-evaluation or rectification despite the abovementioned mechanism, they fill application form duly signed by the COE and Head of the Institution and submit the same to the University for re-evaluation and rectification. The university then proceeds to address these grievances on time.

- The institution **conducts interactive sessions with the successful alumni** to share their experience and valuable knowledge with the students. The students are made aware of the scope and opportunities of the chosen degree programme. **Parents are also made aware of the same during the parent's meetings.** At the onset of each semester, the expected outcomes of each course are communicated to the students at the departmental and college level.
- The pattern of questions and marks for the internal and external exams are discussed and its association with the course outcomes. During the teaching-learning process, the faculties of the college consistently emphasize the targets and standards to be achieved by the students. The institution regularly evaluates the attainment of programme and course outcomes. For this, institution conducts University exams, internal exams and feedback evaluation etc. This enables teachers to accurately evaluate and assess the academic performance of the students.
- The College and Departments organize events in the form of extension lectures, seminars, industrial visits, placement drives, student development programmes, etc. at different levels contributing to the achievement of the programme and programme-specific outcomes which aim to produce graduates to be equipped beyond the academic curriculum.

D.A.V. Centenary College follows a **structured process** for gathering and assessing data on **program outcomes and course outcomes** to **enhance the learning environment** for students. The College

operates by the external and internal assessment schemes specified by the affiliating university, adhering to their norms. The external assessment has 80% weightage and examinations are conducted and evaluated by the university. The teachers collaborate to finalize and upload the detailed internal assessment of 20% weightage on the university portal for inclusion in students' results.

Methods of evaluating the level of attainment of POs and COs in the institution are as follows:

- **Internal Assessments** are aligned with the program and course outcome and their evaluation is based on internal tests, assignments, and the performance of the students in their classes evaluated by the concerned subject teacher.
- External Assessments are evaluated by exams conducted by the university at the end of each semester and external experts appointed by the university for the practical examinations through viva voce and practical files.
- The **Parent University** conducts exams as per the semester pattern. The college measures program outcomes by **assessing the overall pass percentage** of the students and the **merit positions** they hold at the university level.
- Internships/Educational Tours/Field Trips and Field Surveys are organized to attain practical knowledge and experience in their respective discipline. The performance of students in these fields are evaluated by the faculty and by the collaborative agencies.
- Placement Cell organizes the placement drive and selection of students in the placement drive is done by the companies. Placement Cell prepares the students for the better placement of students in the reputed companies and organizes training programs in collaboration with external experts and organizations. It also maintains the records of placements of the students in various government and non-govt. sectors that reflect the success and realization of course and program outcomes.
- Each year for the Progression to higher education, the students of UG and PG courses, are evaluated by the other educational bodies/institutions, and the college also provides letters of recommendation for getting admission both abroad and within the country.
- Program outcomes are also assessed based on students qualifying for various entrance exams and competitive exams like NET/JRF, SLET, CAT, JAM, etc.
- The **awards won** by college students in different disciplines or winning prizes in different intercollege competitions, state level/national level/international level is another parameter to measure the attainment of program outcomes and course outcomes
- The college maintains an **Alumni Association** which reflects that our alumni who are well-settled in different sectors, are connected with the college and they also contribute in college activities. Many of them come back to give extension lectures and impart their wisdom and experiences to the present students. We think that this is an indicator of the accomplishment of the objectives we work towards every day, year after year.

- Well-stocked library and Departmental library facility

- The **college library**, established in 1985, serves as a learning resource center with a wide range of materials. It includes textbooks, reference books, journals, and magazines. Specialized software is used for library operations. The library collection grows annually, with investments in books, journals, subscriptions, and automation. The institutional library aims to provide access to a variety of digital and printed resources to support information and services.
- The college library adopted the **RFID** (**Radio Frequency Identification**) technology for library housekeeping and other operations. It facilitates an efficient security system that includes **tracking of materials, faster circulation of books, inventorying, material handling, automated book-drop** and a self-kiosk, staff work-station, RFID reader, and security gate.
- The college has signed a **MoU with DELNET** in 2023 and registered membership to extend its services by providing E-Resources to staff and students.
- The college library has a collection of **56,048 Books** in different subjects, **11 Hindi newspapers**, **8 English Newspapers, and several magazines**.
- The library offers a **Research Room** to the teachers for their research work and a **Reading Room** for the students to study in their free time.
- There is well stack of **26 Journals** in the college library and **access to various journals via Delnet and Inflibnet** related to various fields i.e., Social Science, Economics, Retail & Management, Humanities, Computer, Science, Sanskrit, etc., to all the teachers and students.
- The library offers an internet and reprography facility, Wi-Fi facility, Reference service, Previous Year University Question Papers, Information deployment and notification, and other required study materials, Newspaper Clipping, etc.
- **E-Library:** The college has the facility of E-Library which includes subscribed Journals, Open Access to full-text Journals, subscribed and open-access books as well as newspapers and magazines.

- The library offers access to 91 E-books from Pearson, 6,000+ e-journals, and over 30 lakhs ebooks through DELNET and a diverse collection of E-journals and E-books via INFLIBNET covering various subjects such as Commerce, Economics, Physics, Chemistry, Math, Geography, English, Literature & Grammar, Fiction, Management, Marketing, Computer Science, General Knowledge, Political Science, and more.

- The library has facilities of LAN & Internet, Wi-Fi Facility, N-List, and Turnitin Plagiarism Software.

Through continuous investment in technology and a commitment to innovation, efforts are made to provide

students and staff with the tools and resources they need to succeed in an increasingly digital world.

- The college focuses on ensuring dependable internet connectivity, facilitated by a leased line offering a bandwidth of **50 MBPS**, which was earlier **20 MBPS**, that guarantees uninterrupted access to online resources and services.
- Currently, there are **7 smart classrooms on campus, up from 2 previously,** equipped with IT equipment such as projectors and smart boards. These facilities are regularly utilized by both faculty and students for presentations and the sharing of information and knowledge.
- Currently, there are 8 computer labs on campus, housing 418 computer systems, upgraded from 347 computer systems, providing students with hands-on experience and access to the latest technology.
- The library subscribes to **DELNET** and **INFLIBNET-N-LIST** on a regular basis.
- The library also renews the subscription to **TURNITIN** every year for plagiarism detection purposes.
- Software facilitates subscriptions to various resources such as **E-books** from Pearson, and **Ejournals** named The Economic & Political Weekly, and a database.
- The college has expanded its **CCTV camera count from 70 to 104** to enhance campus security and ensure the safety of everyone on campus.
- The college has prioritized **communicating electronically** via mail, WhatsApp, etc, to use fewer papers.
- The different departments use platforms for the online conduction of classes and sharing notes, notices, and other information like **Google Classroom**, **Facebook**, **YouTube**, **Zoom**, etc.
- **Biometric scanner** is used for taking attendance of employees.
- The **administrative office's** appliances and equipment like computers, printers, scanners, photostat machines, etc are maintained and upgraded regularly.
- The **website** for the college is routinely updated and an up-to-date user-friendly online **admission portal** is embedded in the website.
- Online Fee Payment i.e. Convenient online fee payment options are offered through various mediums such as cards, and UPI, streamlining the fee collection process for students and administration alike.
- Language Lab i.e., a specialized language lab equipped with dedicated software and hardware supports language learning initiatives, addressing diverse student needs.
- The college hires **computer lab attendants** to take care of computer labs.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

DAV Centenary College, affiliated with the Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak receives primary funding from the Government of Haryana through DHE grant-in-aid, supplemented by contributions from the DAV Trust. Its annual maintenance grant covers salaries, pensions, retirement benefits, and other non-salary expenses. Budget estimates are submitted to the sanctioning authority after

approval by the governing body, with **financial transactions approved by the Principal, Bursar, and A.O. (accounts).** Funds are verified and utilized through committees such as the purchase, building, and finance committees, ensuring prudent planning, allocation, and utilization of resources.

Methods to mobilize resources and funds:

- 1. Total fees collected from students
- 2. Various grants received from ICSSR, DHE, UGC, RUSA, etc.
- 3. Seminar and research project funds received from agencies
- 4. DAVCC's Alumni Association
- 5. Remuneration from Govt. Agency Exams
- 6. Self-finance and add-on courses

Strategies to mobilize resources and funds:

The college maintains financial records at two locations: the Grant-in-Aid (GIA) Account Office and the Self-Finance Scheme (SFS) Account Office. These offices handle records related to staff salaries, grants, scholarships, and revenue/expenditures for different courses. Auditors chosen by the DAV College Managing Committee and the government regularly audit these accounts, covering revenue, expenditure, and stock registers. Any discrepancies are rectified promptly, with records maintained annually.

Financial Audit:

In the internal financial audit, the college follows the following procedure: As per the requirement, each department prepares a proposed budget for their expenditures and makes a sanction letter of the same which is sent to the principal for further recommendation. After making all these expenditures, a statement indicating all the heads of expenditures along with the bills are prepared which are marked by the principal and sent to the concerned accounts office. Before sending the bills to the account office, these are sent to the PA to the Principal for diary entry. In the Account office, the bills are checked and verified by the Head Clerk and signed by the Bursar. Finally, the bills are submitted after duly signed by the principal.

The Department of Higher Education (DHE) and Chartered Accountant (CA) exam conduct regular external audits to ensure accountability, transparency, and compliance with established standards and regulations. These audits help identify any discrepancies, errors, or irregularities in financial records, academic practices, and administrative procedures, thereby promoting integrity and trust within the educational institution and the broader community.

In addition, DAV Centenary College also takes initiatives in the following fields:
